Auxiliary Trivia

While we know the Auxiliary does not get directly involved in military and law enforcement operations. Below is a bit of trivia about Auxiliarist and reservist working together in coastal military operations

Beginning in 1942, in response to the growing German <u>U-Boat</u> threat to the United States, the <u>U.S. Navy</u> ordered the acquisition of the "maximum practical number of civilian craft in any way capable of going to sea in good weather for a period of at least 48 hours." A large number of vessels owned

and piloted by Auxiliarist with crews made-up of Coast Guard Reservists, made-up the bulk of the American coastal anti-submarine warfare capability during the early months of World War II.

None of the two thousand civilian craft, armed with depth charges stowed awkwardly on their decks, ever sank a submarine, though they did rescue several hundred survivors of torpedoed merchant ships. (Wikipedia)
