Flotilla 4-76 Fellowship at Yards



Fellowship has been called a cornerstone of the Auxiliary, and for good reason. It is an opportunity for members of the Flotilla and their families to come together, share stories, and enjoy some food and drink.

Last night, in the spirit of Halloween, Octoberfest, and even a loud and rowdy Philadelphia Union Soccer game, Flotilla 4-76 showed up in force at Yards Brewery Tap Room. Just feet away from where this local brewer creates over 20 different beers, over 20 members of the Flotilla feasted on ribs, wings, and broccoli, and enjoyed some delicious libations.

Some of the Flotilla was even able to have their photo taken with Phang, the Philadelphia Union Mascot.

However, the highlight of the evening was being able to share time with so many Flotilla members and their families.

By the end of the night, everyone was full and knew all about the Philadelphia Union and its fanatical fan base known as the Sons of Ben.

QE for Boat Crew

Flotilla 4-76 is about to embark on re-vitalizing of its assistance to a core mission of the Auxiliary by creating its own Boat Crew.

Currently there are 5 members in training for Boat Crew and 1 in training for Coxswain. If all goes to plan, the Flotilla will have a Coxswain and 6 qualified Boat Crew Members by the summer of 2020.

One of our members, Scott Sigman, just completed his QE for Boat Crew in October and as he explained to me, it was a team effort.

It took two years starting with an in-class program at TRACEN and then many weeknights and Saturdays on the Delaware River in a USCG Auxiliary Facility (a boat certified by the USCG to serve as an official USCG Auxiliary sanction vessel).

In order to become qualified, the member needs to first complete a list of signoffs including knot tying, first aid, swimming, navigation, towing, anchoring, and other boat related tasks. However, these sign-offs are not possible without a mentor or several mentors.

Thankfully, within our Flotilla, FSO-OPS, Ash Kernen is a high skilled member of the Boat Crew and is very close to his qualification for Coxswain. FSO Kernen was able to mentor Scott over the two years, both on the river and in-class.

As Scott explained, the most difficult part of the program is being able to complete several practice stern and side tows and a final sign-off tow because that task requires using two USCG Aux Facilities at the same time and both with a qualified Coxswain and Crew.

Once Scott completed his sign-off for the towing, he was finally ready for his QE day which occurred on Columbus Day.

In Order to complete the QE, Scott was required to participate in each step of the Boat Crew process starting with a pre-underway check. The QE then required Scott to complete a stern and side tow with another Facility, anchoring, navigation, a man over board drill, line handling, and knot tying. After completing the on the water component, the QE then asks random questions from each chapter of the sign-off book. Once that is completed, and you have answered successfully, you pass!

Scott is thankful for the support and time spent by FSO Kernen over the past two years. Scott is also grateful for the help and support of Coxswain Andy Crowley, for not only providing two years of mentorship, but also the use of his boat 993 which is an official Facility used in training and for the QE. Other Auxiliarists who mentored and helped during the two years and at the QE included Tom Kelmartin, John Morrison, John Yowell, Celia Crowley, and Maureen Lucas.

An Informed Auxiliarist Makes a Better Flotilla

It is that time again...elections...come and gone.

What happens now?

The newly elected Flotilla Commander has a bunch of stuff to do even before the New Year starts:

First off, thanks to the current bridge; Flotilla Commander Charles Miller and Vice Flotilla Commander Dot French. They piloted the hardest two jobs in the Auxiliary. Their diligence and competence afford the next bridge to pick up and carry on.

Second: Staff needs to be picked...this one is tough. Staff picks come from those whose competence and perceived competence make them stand out, allegiance to the flotilla, its precepts, and goals are so important, support for the flotilla in terms of presence at staff meetings, general meetings, and the all-important fellowship event sand willingness to lead from the front. This year we are running on a theme: Flotilla building. We need to continue to grow in all areas and all missions. It's not enough to be the leading flotilla in the Division, we, as a flotilla, need to set an example for the Auxiliary. All growth is not equal. Superior Flotilla growth leads to superior Auxiliary growth.

With that in mind, I will enlist the aid of Scott Sigman, Vice Flotilla Commander elect, to help with the selection process. Although the staff serves at the pleasure of the Flotilla Commander, it is managed by the VFC, the chief of staff if you will.

Each Staff member, when appointed, will be assigned at least one Assistant Flotilla Staff Officer. That process will allow for mentoring and create a backup for each office.

Each staff pick will receive a letter asking if they are willing to serve in a position, and a job description will be contained therein. If the person asked is willing to serve after understanding what is expected of them, then a formal notice of appointment will follow...all by the numbers. When the staff picks are complete, a form for that purpose is filed and the staff then becomes the staff. If you are thinking of moving up to Staff Officer, and you are interested in a certain job, just let me know. It would be helpful to know why you selected a position and where you intend to go with it. That gives me some insight.

Thanks to Charles Miller, the Audit Committee and the Budget Committees are in place. The Audit Committee starts it work after the last check for 2019 is cut, and the Budget Committee will present their recommendations at the November Meeting. The budget must be approved by the membership present at that meeting. And to the point of flotilla support, don't forget the Change of Watch is at hand. In my twenty years in the Auxiliary, I have heard time and time again, a Flotilla Commander refers to the flotilla with which they are affiliated as "my flotilla".

Nope, the flotilla belongs to you. The member is the single most important component to the Auxiliary. I have also heard that the Auxiliary is not a democracy. If you pay dues and vote, guess what...you are a part of a democratic organization. Some may like to think this is the military; it is not. It is, however, the uniformed wing of the United States Coast Guard, and instrumentality of the Federal Government. This separates the Auxiliary from all other types of volunteer organizations. Wing; great word. Wings can make you fly, unless they are broken. I would like 76 to be the healthiest wing of this organization. Only you can make that happen. So, are we to be the wings upon which the mission flourishes, or will we need repair? From where I sit, Flotilla 76 is above the crowd in soaring mode. I would like us to fly as high as we can .As it says on our website; a Force Multiplier!

If you have done your Risk Management, you know one of the most important things you can do is step up and speak up. The bridge and staff need to know what is on your mind. The general meeting is a great place to hear you speak up. Your presence there is all important. If you are not there, our flotilla is not the recipient of your input, your intelligence, your ideas, and your knowledge. Don't let the few decide for the many. And further, get involved. If you can't decide where you would like to help, contact the FSO-HR. That is a great first step.
